Thank you for picking up this schedule and considering entering in our Summer Show. We hope that you do.
Lowdham Horticultural Society was founded in 1893 so amazingly this is our 131st year! The first show took place in the August of that year, 1893.
Lowdham Horticultural Society is affiliated to the RHS and is a not-for-profit organisation. The aim of the Society is to promote and advance the enjoyment of horticulture and gardening, encouraging individuals and families to make the most of their gardens.
We hold three shows each year - our Spring Show, the Summer Show and an Autumn Festival. The Summer Show, our biggest of the year, is traditionally held on August Bank Holiday Monday (regardless of weather!).
As well as the three shows, we run a series of monthly talks or demonstrations hosted by guest speakers, organise coach trips and local visits to inspirational gardens, grow plants to sell at our annual plant sale in May and run a subsidised seed scheme.
We welcome anyone who would like to join us and help continue the wonderful tradition of our Summer Show. Our membership year begins at the start of September and our annual subscription is just $£ 10$. We do also welcome non-members to our talks for a $£ 3$ charge.
If you can spare a few hours over the coming weeks or just on Summer Show Day to help out, we would love to hear from you.

## How to enter the Summer Show

## In advance of Show Day

- Familiarise yourself with the schedule and identify the classes you are going to enter.
- Complete an entry form with your name, address, telephone number and email address, listing all your entries.
- A separate entry form must be completed for each competitor.
- Entrants aged 16 years and under require their age on the entry form.
- Entrants aged 16 or under can enter any of the other classes in addition to those specifically for Young People, but will need to complete a separate entry form and will be given a different entrant number for these classes.
- Show day is always busy, so it is helpful to submit your entry form in advance so that entry cards can be prepared ready for you to collect on the morning of the show. You can ring the Show Secretary for an exhibitor's number from $16^{\text {th }}-24^{\text {th }}$ August otherwise you will be allocated a number on show day.
- Completed entry forms can be posted through the door at 5 The Priors or 6 Ton Lane, Lowdham by Friday 23rd August.
- Entry cards can also be picked up from 5 The Priors or 6 Ton Lane if you wish to complete your own and bring them with your entry form on the morning of the show.
- Alternatively, you can bring your completed entry form on the morning of the show and your cards will be completed then.


## On Show Day

- On the morning of the show, bring your exhibits with your entry form (if you have not already returned it in advance) to the marquee at the back of the Village Hall as early as you can after 8am but well before 10.30am, when staging closes.
- Hand your completed entry form with your entry fees of 30p per exhibit to the stewards at the desk who will issue you with entry cards for each of your exhibits.
- Entry in the Young People classes is free.
- Place each of your exhibits with its entry card face down beside it in the correct section on the show bench. Check with a steward that you are putting your exhibits in the right section if you are unsure where they go.
- If you have cut flowers, vases are available for their display, if you wish to use them. There will be tables available for you to prepare your exhibits in the marquee.
- You must vacate the marquee by 10.30am in order for judging to start promptly at 11am.
- Prize money is awarded for first, second and third place in all classes and there are trophies and special prizes in each section.
- We have some advice sheets for those thinking of entering the Show: These notes are intended as a guide to what the judges will be looking for and hopefully allow participants to show off their entries to best effect.
- Above all, showing should be FUN and the more entries we have the better the show.

## Lowdham Horticultural Society through 131 years

## Extracts from our archives

1893 The first Annual Show of flowers, plants, fruit and vegetables in connection with the Lowdham and District Horticultural Society was held in a field at the rear of the Magna Charta Inn.

Newark Advertiser July 26th 1893

1933 Prior to 1933 the Flower Show was organised under the direction of a committee named 'Lowdham and District Branch of the Nottingham Children's Hospital Cot and Free Medicine Fund!' In the five years 1928 - 1933, $£ 1000$ was raised to support these causes.

1947 The Schedule included classes for Half a Pound of Mushrooms (naturally grown), 5 Bantam eggs, Best Chicken Dressed and Trussed and Best Jar of Bottled Fruit.

1948 Last year of the combined Horticultural Show and Gymkhana. The Gymkhana Classes included Style and Appearance, Juvenile Jumping, Musical Poles and Fancy Dress.

1953 The show was held on the wettest day of the year. Nevertheless the number and standard of entries was very high indeed.
Committee Minutes 1954.

1960 A record number of entries (710) despite a heavy thunderstorm. The Show was opened by former soccer star Tommy Lawton who was landlord at the Magna Charta. Mrs Lawton presented the prizes.

Nottingham Guardian August 24th 1960.

## RULES - 2024 SHOW

1. The Show is open to everybody regardless of where they live.
2. Exhibits will be staged on Monday 26th August, between 8 am and 10.30 am, NO ENTRIES ACCEPTED AFTER 10.30 am when a bell will be rung.
3. Judging will commence promptly at 11 am .
4. NO EXHIBITS WILL BE MOVED UNTIL AN ANNOUNCEMENT IS MADE IN THE MARQUEE - AT APPROXIMATELY 4.30 pm .
5. The Society Rules for judging the Horticultural Classes are based on the recommendations of the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS), and the decision of the judges is final.
6. Winners of the Banksian Medal in 2022 may not be awarded the medal in 2023 and the winner in 2023 may not be awarded the medal in 2024 or 2025 under RHS rules.
7. The Novice Classes are for people who have not won a 1st prize in the Main Classes.
The prize money is awarded in these Classes, but will not count towards the totals for the Society's Cups and Trophies.
8. No exhibitor may be awarded more than one prize in any one class.
9. The following scale of points is used to calculate winners of Cups and Section Awards:

Classes $1,33 \& 84$ :
Classes 2, 3, 4, 34, 35 \& 89
Remainder Classes:
The Royal Horticultural Society Bronze Medals will be won outright. The Nottingham Evening News Challenge Cup, The Pearson Bowl, The Walter Bennett Plate, The Hoveringham Trophy, The Fred Furley Memorial Cup, The MacAlpine Challenge Cup, The Smith Memorial Trophy, The George Haggis Memorial Trophy, The T. F. Revell Memorial Cup, The David Rees Memorial Cup, The Burton Challenge Trophy, The Reddish Memorial Salver, The Lowdham Horticultural Society Plate, The LHS Summer Show Winner Trophy, the Charles King Memorial Cup and The Mrs V Birkin Trophy are perpetual challenge trophies which will be held by the winners for 12 months.

## The winners are to give satisfactory security to the Society that the trophies will be returned to the Trophy Secretary two weeks before the date of the following show.

11. In the event of two or more exhibitors having equal numbers of points competing for a cup, medal or bowl, the award will go to the exhibitor having the greatest number of first prizes.
12. All competitors who wish to claim their prize money should apply to the Treasurer between 4 and 5 pm .
13. The Committee will not be responsible for loss or damage to any exhibit or property whilst in its custody.
14. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry.

## NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

- Jars must be clear glass with no commercial markings, clean and free from stickiness and finger marks.
- All preserves should be labelled, stating the contents together with the day, month and year of making.
- Labels should be an appropriate size to the container, straight and placed centrally on the jar.
- A twist top or a wax disc and cellophane cover may be used for jams, jellies and marmalade.
- A wax disc and cellophane cover must be used for lemon curd.
- Twist tops with a plastic lining are best for vinegar preserves.
- New twist lids are recommended as old lids do not always give a good seal and can contaminate the contents.
- Pickles and chutney are best left to mature for 2 or 3 months before showing.

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## Marmalade Cake

- 100 g softened butter
- 100 g caster sugar
- 100 g sultanas
- 100 g currants
- 40 g red glace cherries, quartered
- 2 large eggs
- 175 g self-raising flour
- 2 tablespoons orange marmalade
1.Preheat the oven to $160^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(140^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ fan) or Gas Mark 3 . Grease and line a 2 lb loaf tin.

2. In a mixing bowl, mix together all the ingredients apart from the marmalade (which needs to be saved for later).
3.Turn into the prepared tin and level the top.
3. Bake in the preheated oven for approx. 90 minutes or a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean.
4. Once baked, remove the cake from the oven and allow it to cool in the tin for 10 minutes. Then, remove parchment and transfer it to a cooling rack.
6.To finish, warm the marmalade, spoon over the top of the cake and leave to set.

## Gluten Free Brownies

- 250 g softened butter
- 350 g caster sugar
- 100 g cocoa powder
- Teaspoon vanilla essence
- Pinch of salt
- 100 g chocolate chunks
- 4 eggs
- 350 g gluten free flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder

1. Preheat the oven to $170^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(150^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ fan) or Gas Mark 4 . Grease and line a tin.
2. In a mixing bowl, mix together the flour, sugar, baking powder, cocoa powder and salt.
3. Melt the butter and chocolate together and add to the dry mixture.
4. Once incorporated, add the eggs and vanilla essence. Mix evenly.
5. Turn into the prepared tin and bake in the preheated oven for approx 20 minutes.
6. Once cooked, leave to cool in the tin before cutting into squares.
7.To finish, dust with icing sugar.

## Lowdhams Vegetable Tray 2024 <br> Class 4 <br> COMPETITION RULES:

- All vegetables are to be displayed for effect, 2 of each kind
- $\quad$ They must be displayed within an area measuring $45 \mathrm{~cm} \times 60 \mathrm{~cm}$ ( $18 \times 24 \mathrm{in}$ ) without bending any part of them. No part of them may exceed the size of the tray.
- A tray of the correct size will be provided by the society, or an area can simply be marked on the staging.
- Parsley is allowed for garnishing. However no other foliage or accessories including plates or sand rings are allowed.
- Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string.

The winner of the Lowdhams Vegetable Tray will receive:
1st $£ 10.00$ 2nd $£ 5.00$ 3rd $£ 3.00$
Prize money donated by Lowdhams.

## NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

- $\quad$ Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 7.5 cm (3in)
- Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached.
- Tomatoes must be displayed with the green flower bud case (calyces)
- Judges may handle exhibits, open pods etc. to check for quality.
- The tray, board or staging may not be cut or mutilated in any way e.g. cutting holes for onions to stand in.
- Judges should use their discretion, entries may have come from inexperienced exhibitors.
- Points awarded should be clearly marked by judges on the exhibitor's cards.
- Any queries, other than the above rules, should be referred to, and decided by the Show officials.

Failure to abide by any of these rules will lead to disqualification.

## Lowdhams Flower Vase 2024

## Class 86 <br> COMPETITION RULES:

- This class is for a vase of mixed flowering stems containing a total of between 6 and 12 stems, taken from a minimum of two different kinds of plants.
- Please note that it is two different KINDS of plants, two varieties of the same plant are NOT two kinds.
- The display will be judged out of a total of 35 points, split into: 25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers on display, and 10 marks for the overall presentation and effect of the flowers in the vase.
- The vase will be viewed from all directions.
- Judging of the flowers should be to the normal rules used for other classes.
- Stems used in the display must be showing flowers only; no seed heads or berries will be allowed.
- The vase can be any shape and size and made from any material, but must be in proportion to the display.
- No marks are awarded for the vase itself.
- No accessories whatsoever such as bows and additional foliage will be allowed. Foliage which is growing naturally from the flowering stem, and still attached to that stem, is allowed. Packing material - including Oasis - to keep the stems in place is allowed.

## NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

- Flowering stems can be taken from ANY flowering plant.
- The different kinds of plants need to be taken from different genera For instance, pinks, carnations and sweet william - which are all dianthus would not be classed as different kinds.
- Only fresh, home-grown flowers can be used in the vase. No dried or silk flowers are allowed.
- A vase, by definition, is any vessel that can be used to hold cut flowers and which is taller than it is wide at its widest point.
- This class is open for anyone to enter and is not intended purely for growers who regularly display single species classes at shows.
- Judges should use their discretion when judging the Lowdhams Flower Vase class, bearing in mind that the entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors.
- Judges and exhibitors should note that the display has to be viewed all round.
- The points awarded should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitors' cards.
- Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to, and decided by, the show officials.

Failure to abide by any of these rules will lead to disqualification.
